Invasive **AEDES SPECIES**

Most people are familiar with mosquitoes and their distinctive buzzing sound when flying or their irritating bite. However, the *Aedes* species, specifically the Asian tiger (*Aedes albopictus*) and Yellow fever (*Aedes aegypti*), are two species that are of concern because they can potentially transmit dangerous diseases. These mosquitoes have been found in California, including San Bernardino County.

What diseases do Aedes mosquitoes transmit?

- Zika Virus
- Yellow fever
- Dengue fever
- Chikungunya

How do these mosquitoes transmit these diseases?

These mosquitoes are aggressive daytime biters that transmit the above diseases to hosts (people) from the bite of an infected female *Aedes* mosquito.

What is the preferred environment for these mosquitoes?

- These mosquitoes have a short flight range (1/4 mile) and prefer urban environments that can be found in backyards, including small containers that can hold water.
- These mosquitoes can lay dozens of eggs in water-filled containers as small as a bottle cap.

How can the Aedes mosquito be prevented?

- Dump, drain or scrub small containers that may hold standing water.
- Cover containers that can hold water or place containers upside down.
- Mosquito proof your home by ensuring doors, windows, and screens are in good repair.
- Use insect repellent containing DEET, PICARDIN, or oil of lemon eucalyptus, according to manufacturer's directions if you are in an area with mosquitoes.
